

Broom Creek HMA 2016

The **Broom Creek Hunter Management Area (HMA)** is open to hunt turkeys, sharp-tailed grouse, doves, waterfowl, rabbits, squirrels, predators during daylight hours, antelope, deer, elk, and mountain lions during the specific species seasons as published in the current Game & Fish Commission Regulations and with the following limitations:

- **Each individual must check-in with Camp Guernsey Operations the day PRIOR to EACH hunting/fishing trip to see what portions of the HMA will be available.**
 - Check-in by phoning 307-836-7810 between 12:00 noon and 1:00 PM the day prior to each hunting or fishing trip. General information is available through the same phone number.
 - **Access may be closed or limited to specific lettered areas (A – W, see map) due to ongoing military operations and will be granted on a *first-call, first-serve* basis, as available.**
 - **Each hunter** must have the proper **permission slip, vehicle pass, and a confirmation code** (*received from check-in call*) before entering the hunter management area.
 - **Anyone without proper permission shall be subject to trespass charges.**
 - Non-hunting/ non-permitted persons may assist in game retrieval on the HMA as long as they are accompanying a permitted hunter and do not possess a firearm.
 - **HMA permission is granted for hunting by private individuals only.**
 - **Any other activity, including picking up artifacts, antlers, or rocks; commercial guiding or outfitting; or camping is prohibited!**
- **Hunting Access** (August 15, 2016 – May 20, 2017)
 - **The southeastern corner of the HMA (marked as *CBH* on the map) is reserved for chairbound and blind hunters. Special permission is required for access during regular big game seasons.**

 - Hunters possessing a valid permission slip with confirmation code for that day may take any species of game (*see list at top*) as long as they are in compliance with all other relevant Game & Fish Commission hunting regulations.
 - **Regular season big game hunting:**
 - Limited permission slips will be **issued online, via a random drawing.**
 - Apply July 11 – August 15. *Results will be available August 17.*
 - Fifty (50) big game hunting permission slips will be issued to hunters with **elk licenses** (General or Area 3, Type 6) for the regular elk season: September 15 – October 14.
 - Fifty (50) big game hunting permission slips will be issued to hunters with **deer and/or antelope licenses** for *each* of the following periods:
 - October 1 – 7
 - October 8 – 14
 - **All other species and/or hunt periods:**
 - Permission slips will be issued online (unlimited in number) starting July 11.
- **Hunters are required to deposit their landowner coupon in the nearest drop box (see map) upon harvest** of any big game animal on the HMA. *Failure to promptly complete and return any hunting survey provided by camp staff may result in denial of future permission slips.*
- Motorized travel is allowed on **designated roads ONLY**. Designated roads are posted with a white arrow.
- Speed limit on the Broom Creek HMA is 30 mph unless posted otherwise.
- **Possession or use of ORVs is prohibited on the Broom Creek HMA.**
- Leave all gates as found. Abide by all signs and posted areas.
- **Do not touch unexploded ordinances (UXO) if encountered; report immediately to base personnel.**
- Do not litter.
- Do not shoot in the direction of livestock, buildings, roads, windmills, stock tanks, or any object other than the animal you are hunting. Do not damage fences, range improvements, or harass livestock. Livestock has the right of way.
- **Report any wildlife violations by calling 1-877-WGFD-TIP (1-877-943-3847).** Future hunting and fishing opportunities depend on compliance with all ranch rules, G&F laws, and regulations.

The Hunter Management Program, as part of the Wyoming Game and Fish Department's Access Yes Program, manages hunters on large sections of private lands and, by doing so, preserves hunting opportunities for Wyoming hunters. A Hunter Management Area (HMA) may refer solely to private lands or a combination of private, state trust, and federal lands within ranch boundaries.

The Broom Creek Hunter Management Area is located on the Camp Guernsey military reservation in Platte County, near the town of Guernsey.

Hunters must obtain written permission prior to hunting on the HMA. **Each** hunter must have a complete permission slip with them and each vehicle must have a vehicle identification slip visible on the dash, windshield, or mirror. As part of the HMA agreements, each access area has a unique set of ranch rules, created cooperatively with the landowners. It is the hunters' responsibility to know, understand and comply with all Ranch Rules and Game and Fish Commission Regulations. Failure to comply may result in fines and/or the termination of access privileges.

Various individual training areas are used for live fire training operations throughout the day and night. For everyone's safety, each individual must check in with Camp Guernsey Operations the day prior to each trip to see which areas will be open for hunting or fishing!



The Wyoming Game & Fish Department commends the Wyoming Military Department for their contributions to habitat, sound wildlife management, and hunter access. Hunters should abide by the ranch rules and respect the landowner and the land for continued access. Remember, **we are guests on their property.**

Hunters and anglers seeking permission must apply online before checking in.

Hunters are required to check-in the day before hunting. Call camp operations at 1-307-836-7810 (noon to 1:00 PM) to check in and ask questions.

These coupons are not returned to Game & Fish for reimbursement, but are utilized to record hunter success data and assist in making future management decisions.
